SPECIAL BULLETIN: Fr. Dave on Lifting of Ohio COVID-19 Health Orders 05.13.2021

Dear Franciscan University Community,

Peace and Blessing.

Yesterday Governor Mike DeWine announced that Ohio COVID-19 Health Orders will be lifted on June 2, 2021.

Franciscan University will lift these orders on the same day, making masks voluntary and eliminating other COVID-related protocols that are no longer necessary due to changes in state-wide mandates, including social distancing requirements in offices, facilities, and events.

I do understand that some employees may feel more comfortable keeping the Plexiglas barriers around their workspaces for now, and when possible, you should be permitted to do this. Please work with your supervisor on this specific issue.

The University will end the COVID-19 accommodation process and the COVID-19 emergency paid sick leave program effective June 2, 2021. All employees who have been working remotely or with other flexible arrangements related to the COVID-19 pandemic are asked to work with your supervisors and return to your pre-COVID working situation by June 14 (unless otherwise agreed upon and approved by your supervisor and vice president).

We now take a significant step toward life after this global pandemic.

I want to personally thank you for each and every sacrifice you have made over the last year and a half during the COVID-19 pandemic. When we began this past academic year, we weren't certain we would make it through, but we took a step in faith, and we made it. Praise God!

During the last year, we came together; we sacrificed, adapted, and succeeded in keeping the doors open.
